Important Reminder from your Secretary-Treasurer

Annual Electronic Filing Requirement for Small Tax-Exempt Organizations — e-Postcard (Form 990-N)

Each chapter sponsor needs to file the Form 990-N for his/her Pi Omega Pi chapter. This form is available in electronic form only and is called an e-postcard. You need to file in **January or February**. If you filled last year, you do not need to create an account again.

All Pi Omega Pi Chapters must file a 990-N Form each year (not the 990 or the 990 EZ). Because we are a subchapter and are tax exempt with receipts less than \$25,000 a year, we need to submit Form 990-N. The form is informational only but must come from you as the local chapter sponsor. This requirement is a result of the Pension Protection Act of 2006 and is for tax periods beginning after December 31, 2006. If you fail to do so, you will lose your tax-exempt status after three warnings. Each subchapter fills out a 990N form because it is safe to assume that we do not have receipts of more than \$25,000.

Ergonomics in the Computer Classroom

Ergonomics in the classroom has been frequently overlooked until here lately when computers have become a mainstay. In the past, computer labs were normally set up on folding tables, with normal chairs and the monitors sitting on top of the desktops. This was the easiest way to put the lab together, and we weren't paying much attention to the damage that could be caused by repetitive tasks over extended periods of time. Now that there are studies about the harm that sitting in front of a computer all day with bad posture can do, teachers must be smarter about the set-ups of their classroom.

Ergonomic classroom furniture needs to accommodate various height, weight and physical challenges of individuals with class changes throughout the day. This necessitates adjustable seating and work spaces that do not become distractions for students.

The keyboard should be 28 inches from the floor for optimum comfort. The CPU should be stored in a shelf below the desk so that it is out of sight but still in reach for the students. Cords need to be organized and out of sight as much as possible to keep the room from looking cluttered and to avoid tripping or accidental unplugging. This will help students focus on their work.

The floor plans for a computer lab is a consideration. Computer classrooms today aren't necessarily just used for computer use. Having moveable tables and chairs if you have a mobile lab so that you can move the students into small groups to work together on projects. If you have a desktop lab, you could put the computers around the outside edge of the classroom so that the teacher can walk around and easily help any student with a question. Also, you could set the desktops in small circles to promote group work and communication between students. All of these are great ways to keep your students happy and healthy in your computer lab.
